### *International Journal of Stroke*

#### Style guide 2006

The *International Journal of Stroke* is published on behalf of the International Stroke Society.

The aim of the *IJS* is to concentrate on the clinical aspect of stroke with basic science contributions in areas of clinical interest and to collate information from all around the world from varying sources, for the benefit of our readership.

The *IJS* is a peer reviewed journal. All manuscripts will be reviewed by leaders in the appropriate field.

*IJS* commission articles and accept original submissions.

Review manuscripts are to be 4000–8000 words, not including references. Leading Opinion manuscripts should be up to

1000 words. News from the regions should be up to 1000 words and Clinical Trials section also up to 1000 words.

Authors are encouraged to present their work in such a way that it engages and informs.

**DO NOT USE ANY FORMATTING OR CORRECTION LABELLING OPTIONS IN SUBMITTED MANUSCRIPTS.**

All manuscripts are considered for publication with the understanding that they are submitted to this journal only and have not been published, submitted simultaneously (or accepted for publication) elsewhere; that they are the original work of the author(s); and that they may not be reprinted without the consent of *IJS*. Authors will be required to complete an *Assignment of Copyright* form on acceptance of their paper.

**Presentation of the manuscript for Topical Review articles**

Authors must provide final copy in electronic form via email, [cljenkins@nsri.org.au](mailto:cljenkins@nsri.org.au)

Documents should be double spaced throughout and should be assembled in the following order:

1. Title page
2. Abstract
3. Text

4. References

5. Figures (with legends)

6. Tables

Please include a word count (excluding references and figures) and use automatic page numbering. Do not use automatic formatting such as footnotes, endnotes, headers, and footers.

### **Title page**

The title should be short, relevant to the article and designed to generate interest.

### **Abstract**

This should be no more than 200 words. Do not cite references in abstract. Do not use acronyms or abbreviations. Provide a maximum of seven key words for use as indexing terms. The abstract for a review article should be assembled according to the following headings.

Background

Summary of review

Conclusion

## **Text**

The manuscript should be assembled with an introduction, a conclusion, and headings throughout. Refer to previous editions of *IJS* for examples.

Drugs must be referred to generically; trade names may be included in parentheses. Do not use acronyms or abbreviations. Headings and subheadings may be used in the text. Indicate the former by capitals, the latter in upper and lower case. DO NOT include author details (including contact details) in the text; ensure they are at the beginning or end of the manuscript.

Word limit of up to 4000-8000 applies to all review articles and a 700-800 word limit for Leading Opinion section of the journal.

## **References**

These must be limited to the work cited in the paper and should not be a bibliography of the subject. Personal communications and unpublished material are not acceptable as references. Each reference should conform to the Vancouver style, and references should be numbered consecutively in the order in which they are first mentioned in the text. List all authors (include all initials) when there are six or fewer; when seven or more,

list the first three and add 'et al'. Give the title of the paper in full; the title of the journal abbreviated according to Index Medicus (if not listed by Index Medicus spell in full); the year; the volume number and the first and last page numbers of the article, eg.

### **Illustrations**

Illustrations are encouraged for their educational value. Diagrams, line drawings, photographs or flow charts are valuable but their use will be subject to editorial judgment. Photographic illustrations and diagnostic imaging media must be supplied in electronic form. The only

acceptable format is Tiff or JPEG file, at 300 dpi.

Illustrations should carry an appropriate figure number and the top should be clearly labelled if it is not obvious.

Figure legends should be no more than 25 words.

Tables must supplement the text without duplicating it.

Each should be numbered, typed on a separate electronic sheet, and have an appropriate title, all manuscripts must be in basic word format, **we cannot accept PDF files.**

Please don not create tables as a JPEG file if it can be avoided. They need to be in word format for editing purposes.

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
